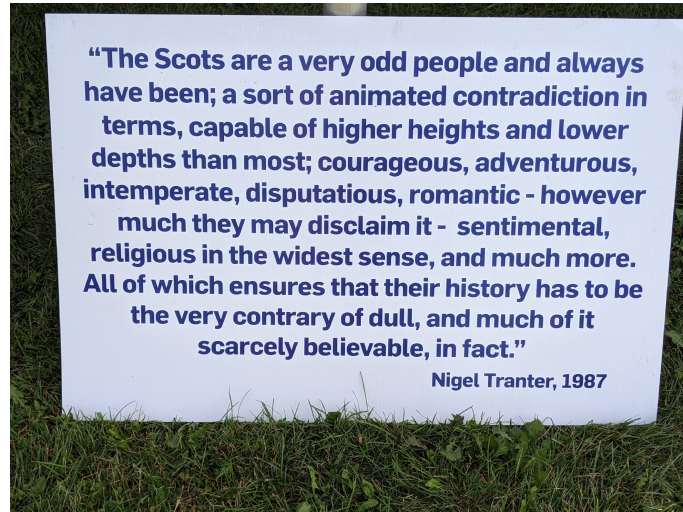

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

Historian's Corner

THE POLLOCK MEDAL – FIELD MARSHALL SIR GEORGE POLLOCK

For almost a century the Pollock Medal was awarded to the “Most Distinguished Cadet of the Season” at the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, England, and its predecessor the Military Academy at Addiscombe. The medal was made of gold, not quite 2 inches in diameter, showing an image of Field Marshall Sir George Pollock (1786-1872), Baronet of the Kyber Pass. The medal was created in 1844 when the British inhabitants of Calcutta established a fund for its award. It was awarded twice a year until 1939 when the Academy was disestablished during World War II. After the war Woolwich was consolidated with the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, to form the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, and the Pollock Medal was discontinued in favor of the Queen’s Medal, awarded to the top cadet of each class

The original medal bore the inscription

MAJOR-GENERAL SIR GEORGE POLLOCK, K.C.B.

Bengal Artillery, Cabul 1842

Treachery avenged – British honour vindicated – Disasters retrieved – British captives delivered
Khyber Pass forced – Jellalabad relieved – Victories of Mamoo Khail, Jugdulluck, Tezeen, Istaliff

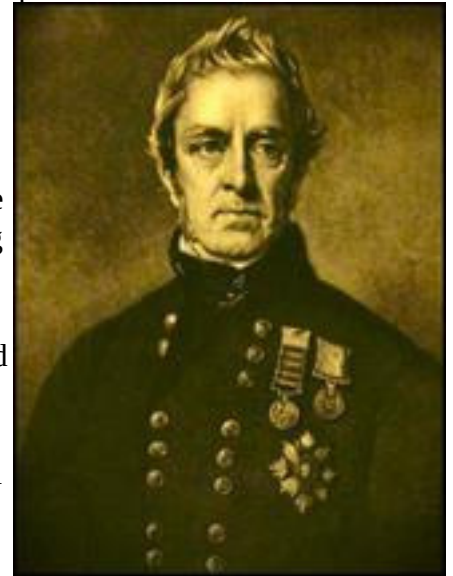


Sir George Pollock was a redoubtable soldier with a long career in India, Burma and Nepal, but it was his campaign in Afghanistan, actually a rescue mission, for which he is most noted and what the Pollock Medal was created to honor. He was born in London in 1786, the son of David Pollock (1739-1815), a cordwainer or leather smith, who became known as the Saddler to the King for his services to King George III and his successors. David Pollock came from a gentry family of Berwick-on-Tweed on the Scottish border but moved to London early in his career to set up shop in Piccadilly. He must have been a remarkable craftsman to have risen from a commonplace background to win the King's nod as royal leather purveyor. In any case, his business was the pathway for access to the British upper classes by which David's sons gained entre to very distinguished careers, and the origin of the British branch of the Pollock family still prominent to this day. Two of the Saddler's other sons had equally distinguished careers – Sir Frederick Jonathan Pollock, Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, and Sir David Pollock, Chief Justice of Bombay.

The Russian and American attempts to gain control of Afghanistan are familiar to us from recent history. The British made a similar attempt in 1839-1842 which is not as well known. In their case, it was not just a failure but an utter catastrophe in which the British government contingent, military forces and camp followers were completely annihilated. The one bright spot in its inglorious history was Sir George Pollock's subsequent bold strike through a very hostile country to rescue a contingent of British citizens still held captive at Kabul. He did this basically on his own initiative without higher level knowledge or approval other than some vaguely worded orders that he freely interpreted at his own discretion. In so doing he put both his career and his life on the line in an effort that he was in no way obligated to undertake.

In 1839 Lord Aukland, the Governor General in India, made an ill-conceived attempt to extend British suzerainty into Afghanistan by installing a British-leaning tribal leader as king in 1839. Forces were sent into the country and were initially successful but by the end of 1841 the failure of the undertaking was clear and the situation becoming desperate. The decision was made to evacuate from Kabul and retreat to Jalalabad, the next nearest British military post about 100 miles to the east, through treacherous terrain and a hostile enemy in the middle of an Afghan winter. They set out in January 1842 with 5000 British and Indian troops, 12,000 camp followers, wives and children. It was a mission doomed from the start. Only one person, the regimental surgeon, Dr. Brydon, is known to have survived and completed the journey. The only other survivors were a contingent of 115 persons that had been captured and taken to Kabul.

In April 1842 George Pollock, by then a Major General serving in India, was placed in charge of the British Army in Peshawar and sent to relieve the forces at Jalalabad which were under siege. This required a brutal engagement at the outset just to get through the Khyber Pass, usually an impregnable point of resistance, but accomplished with minor losses. After his arrival at Jalalabad and securing the area Pollock took it upon himself to march on to Kabul with the intent of rescuing the captive citizens and exacting some retribution for the enormous disaster inflicted on British forces. A series of hard-fought battles followed at Tezeen, Gandamak, and Jugdulluck Pass but the Army forced its way to Kabul and secured the capital by September. Linking up with another British force they pursued a fleeing Afghan army and rescued the captive British citizens which included the family of the British commander of Jalalabad. General Pollock remained in Kabul for about a month and had its Grand Bazaar totally destroyed before returning to Pakistan through the Kyber Pass. The rescued citizens were returned to India.



Field Marshall Pollock made a point of personally attending every Woolwich graduation ceremony at which the Pollock Medal was awarded until his final year, 1872. He is buried in Westminster Cathedral.

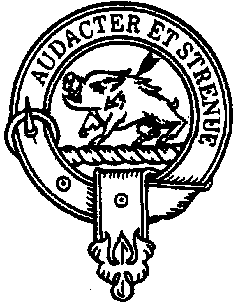
